# Hidden in Plain Sight

## Gangs and Exploitation

Headline statistics indicate a drop in gang activity and exploitation.

They show a reduction in drug-related arrests as a proxy for gang activity, and a drop in children 'missing from home' and, therefore, a reduction in county lines as a form of child criminal exploitation.

**However**, NYA have dug deeper, going beyond the headlines to establish that there has been a change in patterns of behaviour rather than necessarily an overall reduction. These patterns will vary by area and by region, but there is an emerging picture of gang activity throughout the COVID-19 pandemic.

# Scale of need



- 60,000 young people identify as a gang member
- 300,000 young people know someone **who's in a gang**
- 500,000 young people in groups exposed to '**risky behaviour**' associated with gangs
- 700,000 persistently **absent** from education
- 380,000 young people are homeless or at risk of **homelessness**
- Many vulnerable young people still going outdoors to avoid toxic trio when trapped at home.
  
- COVID19: **3x** the number of young people in need post COVID19
- COVID19: Gangs preyed on **different demographics**. Young women, those with SEND and younger ages.

# Drug supply changes - COVID19




- Lockdown restricted and changed the flow of drugs into the UK.
- Over and under supply of drugs due to supply chain disruption.
- Ports closed and restricting public transportation hit the capacity to run a line.
- Gang activity became increasingly hidden as detection methods couldn't keep up with behavioural changes.
- Gang leaders had to take a more public role.

**Youth workers reporting gangs using lockdown/restrictions to recruit more vulnerable young people.**

# Young people today are not the young people of yesterday.

So we can no longer focus on old models and approaches rather we should be adapting new models and approaches to meet the needs of children and young people in 2020 and beyond.



# 'On Road' A Youth Work Response



**Language and Behaviour** - Understanding the changing face of youth cultures and being able to adapt in any settings.

**Dress Code** - Understanding that clothing is symbolic and depending on the individuals/groups engaged, can be a barrier or used to gain access.

**Knowledge (Agenda, Grassroots, Geography, History, Interventions and Boundaries)** - Knowledge exceeds just knowing your craft but also includes the knowledge of the people, community and spaces of engagement. Also, understanding which models and interventions have not been successful vs being unsuccessful in particular environments in order to develop appropriate responses.

**Credibility** - It is not just about what you are but focusing on 'who' you are. Young people that live deviant lifestyles will not work with people who have no credibility amongst their peers, family and wider community.


# ‘On Road’... Cont.

**Social Capital** - It is not what you know, but who you know. Most young people will not seek help but if you are the person they trust, using that trust can help them access services that they would not engage with otherwise.

**Gender** - Recognising that gender roles are important when addressing young men or women that are victims/perpetrators of youth criminality.

**Legislation and Policies - Safeguarding and Risk Assessment** - Ensuring that one understands the importance of following and creating policies aimed at ensuring the safety of both the professional and young people. In addition, it is also important to note that some youth work policies may be very different to how other organisations work. i.e. with lone working, one to one support or mediation in hostile environments.

**Managing Conflict** - Acknowledging that when working in environments that are violent or have been impacted by gangs, there could be significant community conflicts. However, the principles of ‘on road’ youth work if applied correctly enables professionals to navigate these environments in a safe way.
